Hi Tim,

Cargill proposes a relatively minor change to the wheat standards as outlined below.

Under the definition of Objectional Material in the commodity standards there's no specific reference that stones greater than the allowed tolerance are defined under this category and therefore a load can be rejected at any stage of the receival process – ie a low level contamination could be missed at the sample stand but be detected during discharge of the load. Detecting stones above the allowed tolerance is not an un-common occurrence so specific reference should be made under the definition of Objectionable Material to avoid any confusion of how the standards are to be applied.

Below is some suggested wording that could be added to the standards (additional wording in red):

Other

This refers to any other commercially unacceptable contaminant such as animal excreta, glass, concrete, fertiliser or metal **and stones or other contaminants greater than the tolerances allowed in these Standards.**

Given this is a relatively minor change, Cargill proposes that it's implemented for the 2020/21 Standards.
